TUDOR SQUARE – AGENDA ITEM 6

i) **Enhancement Scheme - Progress since 5 March**

1. **Planning Consent**

The two planning conditions have now been satisfied.

2. **Start Date** – work will start on Monday 20 August and is expected to last 12 weeks.

3. **Lease** - East Herts Council Estates Department have been advised of the start date for works so that they can finish preparing the draft.

4. **Businesses, residents and the market** – I will be working with the contractor to let businesses and residents surrounding Tudor Square what arrangements will be made for access and what measures will be taken to minimise disruption from noise, dust etc. East Herts Council's Market Manager has been advised with a view to attending a meeting to discuss relocation of the market during construction.

5. **Contract Meetings** – a pre-start meeting was held on 18 May and attended by Cllr S Reed, the Town Clerk, representatives of Barker Associates (Project Managers) and Honour Landscapes (contractors). Site visits will be held weekly in the first 4 weeks of the works, then fortnightly thereafter.

6. **Events** – Music and Motors is being held in Tudor Square on Saturday 16 August. The work will start just after this and will be completed in time for Dickensian Evening. Ware Town Partnership have expressed concern that they will not be able to accommodate the same number of stalls in Tudor Square as before and we will be meeting them to discuss this. The works will also affect the last two sessions of Street Food Heroes and we will be discussing this with the organiser and East Herts Council's Market Manager.

EAST OF ENGLAND TO BENEFIT FROM £1M INVESTMENT

A partnership of destinations from Hertfordshire to Northumberland, including Visit Herts, has secured a £1m investment from the Discover England Fund to encourage more German visitors to explore Eastern England.

The money will be spent on creating a new 300-mile touring route between London and Northumberland that combines well-known visitor destinations with those that are off-the beaten track. New itineraries will be developed that bring together attractions, accommodation options, places to eat and activities to create a route that is culturally rich and quintessentially English.



Visit Herts Chief Executive Sandra Matthews-Marsh MBE said, "Hertfordshire has so much for international visitors and this project will help us to attract more people to visit and enjoy what we have to offer. We welcome the opportunity to work in partnership with colleagues and make it easier for people to plan and book a trip to Eastern England".

The project is being led by destination management and marketing organisation NewcastleGateshead Initiative (NGI) working with other destination organisations and local authorities up and down the country. Sarah Stewart, Chief Executive of NGI, said: "We are delighted to secure this funding and to be working closely with partners on this exciting project. The touring route will bring economic benefits to the region and is a great opportunity for businesses to attract international visitors.

"We know that Eastern England has so much to offer and we look forward to creating a route that showcases our history and countryside, our market towns and cities, and shines a light on a wonderful part of the country."

Germany has been chosen as the target market because touring is a familiar and well-loved holiday choice for Germans and because there is good travel connectivity with Eastern England. The project has an emphasis on helping businesses to operate in the international market and make them bookable by independent travelers as well as tour operators and travel agents who are influential with German consumers.

The East of England Touring Route is one of a number of successful projects to receive funding from the UK Government's £40 million Discover England Fund. The Fund is administered by VisitEngland and aims to ensure that England stays competitive in the rapidly growing global tourism industry, by offering world-class English tourism products to the right customers at the right time. The Fund is a central government funded programme of activity, supported by match funding by partners in the public and private sectors.

1. APOLOGIES

Apologies for absence were received from Cllr J Kaye, T Baker (Ware Bowling Club), John Wing (Ware Museum), Jan Wing (Ware Town Partnership), V Belinis (Herts Wheelers & Active East Herts)

2. MINUTES OF LAST MEETING

Minutes of the meeting held on 5 October were noted.

3. IMPROVING ACCESS TO PSYCHOLOGICAL THERAPIES (IAPS)

A presentation was given by Alistair Kay of the Herts Wellbeing Team.

- IAPS evolved from an economist report highlighting the loss of working hours due to mental health issues.
- The aim was to improve treatment for those in work.
- IAPS services was an effective way to treat common mental health problems, such as anxiety, stress, depression
- Cognitive Behaviour Therapy (CBT) was effective but had not been very accessible through the National Health.
- GP's had been pushed into offering medication.
- As a result, there was now a huge investment in developing the service locally.
- Now an easy access service for anyone to self-refer for treatment.
- In Hertfordshire, self-referral was via the website or form.
- Anyone from 16 up could use the service
- It was for people struggling but needing assistance.
- Not for more severe mental illness, eg psychosis, schizophrenia, dementia
- Initial phone assessment within 28 days to assess what needs are
- Target – to get 800 people per month into treatment in South and East Herts.
- Services offered – CBT via computer, the team can check progress; groups – education rather than disclosure; counselling.
- Service tailored to what is most effective for the individual.
- Large volume of referrals and they have to be balanced with the effectiveness of the treatment.
- There are a lot of prompted (ie by the GP) self-referrals. Saves GP time.
- Effectiveness is measured as part of the services funding targets.

Ware in Bloom – Plans are underway for 2018 summer planting. The colour theme this year is deep pink and white. We have had sponsorship for our 3D bear “Wareington” once again for the Priory grounds. Our volunteers have continued to maintain all our beds with spring colour. We are also partnering with Guideposts to help stock their shop in Cross Street with plants. Once again this year we partnered with Ware Rotary to plant 5000 crocus bulbs to signify the International project to eliminate polio. We were the charity matched with Thundridge School this year and the school raised £136 with plant sales and car washing. We always welcome new helpers.

In June 2018 Ware in Bloom are partnering with Tower Road Residents Association to help create a Welly Trail at Tower School and some planted boxes in Tower Road. There will be a social event at Tower School on Thursday 7th June 3.30pm to 6.00pm included a BBQ when the wellies will be planted up and displayed on the railings of the school. Donations of old wellies are welcomed – they can be dropped at 99 New Road, Tower School, Guideposts Shop in Cross Street or left at Ware Town council for collection. The welly trail is a pilot we hope to roll out across Ware once this year has been trialled and reviewed. The project is being funded by and East Herts Council Community Grant. John and Jan Wing were delighted to have been recognised in April with a Personal Award from the High Sheriff, Will Hobhouse, for their volunteering in the town.

Dickensian Evening

Dickensian 2017 went very well and Rebecca Wing has now fully taken over as Organiser. For 2018 the booking system is being completely revised to automate more of the paperwork. Bookings will open June/July. We are very grateful for the many and varied volunteers who give help on the night including Police Cadet, HRC Events Management and Public Services Students, Hertford and Ware Beekeepers and the Dickensian Committee and particular recognition of the work of Raynet in keeping the event family oriented and safe. Thank you to Ware Town Council for their continued financial support of this community event. The date of 2018 Dickensian is Friday 7th December.

Southern Maltings

Work continues to bring the Southern Maltings to life with regular Music Events and new Comedy nights starting in May. The Eastern End (formerly Ware Arts Centre) continues to be well used. The former Waggers, now known as Southern Maltings, has recently hosted Music Events, Charity nights for Druglink and Hospice, a Tea Dance (planned to be a regular Quarterly Sunday afternoon feature), Children’s Crafts at Easter, More tea dances and a Grease Celebration Cinema in the summer. There will be events at the Southern Maltings in July during Ware Festival (Southern Maltings are the Charity for Ware Festival this year and The Ware 10 Joggers are sharing their charity fundraising with Air Ambulance and SM). the Fun Palace will return on 6 and 7 October with some exciting new attractions and some children’s film experiences in the Autumn and at Christmas.

The Development project works: A Planning application for the full project is due to be submitted by 20 April and hopefully will be considered favourably by the East Herts Planners. Works to the downstairs to remove the 1993 additions have been delayed due to issues around Building Control and fire resistance and the need to prioritise the detailed planning for the full scheme. All is now back on track for a completion enabling downstairs to open sometime in June.

The Southern Maltings continues to be supported by a large number of volunteer helpers at their events and we hope this will continue into the future as more events are planned. We are grateful for the support that Ware Town Council have given the Maltings in these critical early stages.

Community Voluntary Services Broxbourne and East Herts

The CVSBEH continues to support local organisations with advice around funding and currently GDPR guidance. We have extended the lease of 20 Tudor Square for another year, a small hub available for hire for local groups. We are opening a new Skills Hub in Waltham Cross next Tuesday 17 April which is being partnered by Hertford Regional College, HAFLS (Hertfordshire Adult Family Learning Service) and many others. Our centre at the Nigel Copping Community Building continues to be busy hosting many local organisations and partners (East Herts Social Prescribing Officer).

2018 Beekeeping Activity in the District

#1 2017 Events and Shows numbered 20 in total, all were performed with no major incidents, with the minimum of fuss, all volunteers fully observing the regulations. With Risk Assessments in place and strictly applied.

#2 Hertfordshire Beekeeping Show held at W.G. City in March, was well received by all who attended with Trade Stalls of Beekeeping Equipment, Talks by Highly Skilled Beekeepers & good standard of refreshments.

#3 The Spring Beginners Beekeeping Course is happening this April and will be concluded on 22nd April with over 28 new Beekeepers obtaining their first certificate's.

#4 Our 2018 Show & Event program is being implemented and planned with over 22 activities on the calendar. Selling Beekeeping Produce and spreading the word just how important bees are to our ever-day life.

#5 The Beekeeping Out-Reach-Program, which also has full table of links and talks planned for: School's, Club's and Associations, through-out the district which will provide all interested parties, with a comprehensive guide to the practical skills required to be practised when Beekeeping.

#6 Last but not least, is our Members Social and Club activities which include our :- 'Annual Cream Tea Party' with a wide selection of both bee hives and cakes being supplied by members a Beekeeping Equipment Raffle, The very well supported 'BBQ with Apiary Inspection Tour' with Burgers, Hot Dog's, Cakes all awash with Beer & Pimm's, The Honey tasting, harvest Curry Night at the local Indian Restaurant, together with the end of year Festive Dinner.

Our 2018 Calendar for the forth coming year is full to the brim of activities.

CHRISTMAS LIGHTS – AGENDA ITEM 12

The Events Organiser has received correspondence from Mark Powell, who is working on establishing an Arts Project in Ware for 2019. His initial ideas, called "12 in a Bed Festival" are attached. He is seeking to work with local partners such as, Hertford Regional College, the Southern Maltings and local business, Vintage by Vanessa.

He is trialling the project this year with an Art Trail in the town with art from HRC students being showcased in the town. Details as follows:-

"Ware is hosting its first Art Trail from 7th to 22nd July 2018 at 15 local places in and near Ware High Street with an exhibition at The Southern Maltings for a further week after.

We are looking for local artists to submit their work for a chance to be included in our trail. So if you are acrylic painter, watercolour expert, textile guru, chronic crocheter, serious sculptor or any other form of artist we want to hear from you!!

Sample pieces of work can be submitted to The Southern Maltings, Kibes Lane, SG12 7BS on Sunday 24th June. All pieces need to be labelled with artists name and contact details.

Installation of pieces at each venue will be on Friday 6th July.

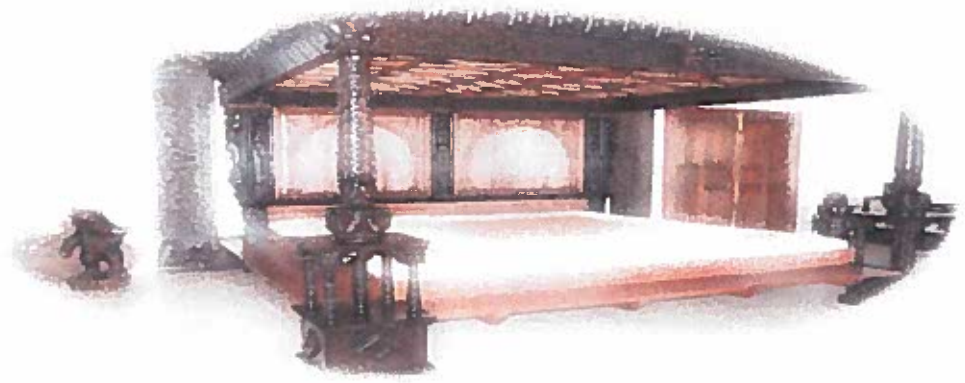
